- 1) Adult and Dislocated Worker FY 2017 funds were reduced by 0.496 percent due to the Continuing Appropriations Act. The reduction was absorbed in State Administration.
- 2) The reduction in Adult and Dislocated Worker funds was amended to a 0.1901 percent reduction in the short-term Further Continuing Appropriations Act for FY 2017. The increase was absorbed in State Administration.
- 3) Dislocated Worker FY 2017 funds were increased by \$10,084 due to the Continuing Appropriations Act. The increase was absorbed in State Rapid Response.
- 4) All reductions to Adult and Dislocated Worker funds were eliminated; original appropriated levels were restored in the Consolidated Appropriations Act for FY 2017.
